BASIC PRINCIPLESFor a responsible analysis of our political landscape

Democracy is not understood exactly in the same way by all. However, we all subscribe to a Constitution and to a system of election that guarantees "representation" in government roughly proportional to the support received by different political parties at election time.

To guarantee democracy, we need to guarantee that the political, the judiciary and the executive powers are independent from each other.

Morality is also understood differently by different people. On the one side materialistic relativism understands morality as adapting to the times and reflecting today's "values". On the other side people of faith favour a moral code that is unchanging and founded on religious values. People of faith also understand, as part of their moral obligation, the need to personally help other people in need.

The family has an important and necessary role in society. The family is the basic building block of any society. When families are prosperous, economic enterprise flourishes.

The right to life, the right to freedom, and the right to own property are fundamental human rights that we all possess by nature. All other rights and responsibilities derive from these, such as the freedom of speech or the protection from being robbed.

The question of "strategic voting" has mudded the political waters in Ontario for many years. People of faith have been torn between voting for the greater good, according to their moral principles, or voting according to a short term "strategy" to make their vote count. With the 2007 provincial election a Referendum question will be on the ballot to change the way we select our MPPs.

With a new system of elections, all ballots will count and contribute to elect your party in government. Thus you will always have a person representing you in government, and democracy will be better served.

It is up to you to do the research and come to a conclusion.

If you want to be effective, then you should start your investigation now, rather than waiting until it is too late to act on your decision and support the party that represents your family and your values.
